THE BOG HERMIT

I'm sure many of you have heard stories about a "Bog Hermit" who lived in or near Cedar Bog. Here is a bit of information that came our way recently:

David Orrin Steinberger was born on March 25, 1857 in Champaign County, one of six children born to George and Barbara Elizabeth Funk Steinberger. He attended a nearby common school at an early age and during the 1873-1874 school year enrolled in the Wittenberg Preparatory Department. By the following year he was in the Sub Freshman Class. Steinberger later studied at the National Design and Art League Schools in New York City, and in 1894, returned to Wittenberg College to teach art.

During the Spanish American War Steinberger drew the "Accoloid" otherwise known as an allegorical picture of Cuba, and donated the drawing to the American Red Cross.

Around 1900 he was stricken with tuberculosis. Believing a cure could be found if he moved west, Steinberger traveled to Colorado for a time, but returned to his father's farm having made the decision

to live the remainder of his life outdoors. His home for over 14 years was a combination tree house and cabin built at the base of a tall oak tree, along the banks of Mad River on Route 68, a mile south of the Champaign County line. A tree house he called "Camp A Loft" was constructed for him on the farm. Steinberger's health improved considerably with outdoor living, so much that he believed it to be a cure and never again lived his life surrounded by four walls.

Steinberger became known as "the man who lived in a tree", and as "the Hermit of Mad River". He died on Dec 12, 1945 at the age of 88. He is buried in Ferncliff Cemetery in Springfield.





We have been working with several agencies on habitat restoration this past year. The Ohio Natural Areas and Preserves Association (ONAPA) and the Ohio Department of Natural Resources, Division of Natural Areas and Preserves (DNAP) and numerous volunteers have worked service days to clear and restore habitat. The hope is this effort will benefit the Eastern Massasauga Rattlesnakes that call Cedar Bog home. The corridor created between known habitat and restored prairie habitat should allow the Massasaugas to expand into new areas. One more service day is scheduled for October 19, 2021.


